Create Webinar Presentations


Decide on topics (your input really helps)

The website also needs attention







- 1. Work from a to do list
- 2. Toodledo and Asana are the project management systems I use
- 3. Write everything on a list

Projects, techniques, books to read, movies to watch, lunch dates, vacations, goals, EVERYTHING!

I do it all on the computer in this system because:

It is convenient for me

Once I have it written down I don't have to waste energy trying to remember it

How I make things work of me.

- 4. Transfer to a weekly to do list
- 5. Transfer to a daily to do list
- 6. Transfer to an hourly to do list
- *This hourly to do list was a real eye opener for me
- I found lots of areas I was spending way too much time (office stuff)
- 7. I Do NOT fill in all my time slots with things I must do.
- 8. I do an "Hour of Power" daily
- 9. I plan an hour of time to have nothing to do, but relax each afternoon
- 10. My day starts with 8:15 Mass and ends about 11:00 with lots of time for work, family and friends in each day



I am a very visual person...I need to be able to easily see my things to be inspired (and to remember what I have)














I think the board that are actually designed for fabric are neater and will hold up longer, but I didn't feel like I could give up the added space that they would take up.









