

Create the background of your choice with decorative stitches This eliminates the "What do I put in the center of this great design?" question!







The center is filled nicely with decorative stitches and the "framed" nicely

Note: The frame also enlarges the "design" size nicely

Dimensional Accents











The flowers are made from organza. (Part of the appliqué is also organza)

Make sure your iron is not too hot, and always test on a very small corner first.

Use the same thread in the bobbin as in the needle





Hoop two layers of organza (no stabilizer) and stitch out as many flowers as needed. Just as the instructions in the book tell us

(The hoop to the right will form one flower)

Trim the threads and use the heat tool to remove the excess fabric from around the flowers or you can cut out the flowers. Both ways are correct.











One flower section is larger then the other 4, this is the base or bottom layer of the flower, the other four are the petals Fold one of the smaller flowers in half. Lay it on top of the base and pin in place.

Fold the second petal in half and lay it on top of the first petal at a 90 degree angle and pin in place.

Do the same for the third petal

The fourth petal will be folded in half, placed on top of the 3rd petal at a 90 degree angle, then carefully lift the first petal that is underneath it and tuck the fourth petal under it.









Stitch the petals together either by machine or by hand (both ways are correct)

I stitched by machine free motion.

Embellish with a button or crystals and the crystal wand.

- 1. Mark your fabric for Decorative stitches
- 2. Fuse the Christmas Tree
- 3. Embellish the tree (Bobbin Work)
- 4. Fuse "fusible web" to the back of the frame fabric
- 5. Trace the frame shape on to the protective paper of the fusible web
- 6. Cut out the center of the frame
- 7. Place the Frame Fabric on top of the project making sure it is centered, wrong side touching the tree and right side facing up
- 8. Fuse in place
- 9. Stitch around the raw edge of the frame with a decorative stitch.

Applique'-Lettering-Frame

- Mark the center of your fabric for embroidery (Solid cream silk)
- Stitch out the letters and the appliqué' heart
- While project is still in the hoop, place frame fabric on top of project right side up
- The embroidery machine will do an outline of the frame
- Remove the hoop from the sewing machine
- Cut out the center of the frame
- Place the hoop on the machine
- Finish the embroidery, the decorative stitches around the words.

Texture/finish is often a so subtle you may not realize that the texture/finish is what is making your project extraordinary

In this quilt it is not only the colors but also the texture and finish that make this so striking.





These red roses are velvet. A beautiful rich texture





These yellow flowers consist of:
Solid color cotton (matt finish)
Solid Satin (shiny finish)
Fairy Frost Cotton (matt and shiny finish)



These purple flowers are Solid Satin (shiny finish)

When these textures and finishes are combined they give a stunning result.






In this project the texture is not so subtle: The green loopy yarn that surrounds the center dresden plate is very bold.

The flowers and leaves are made from velvet and silk fabrics.

The sashing is silk and the border is a cotton.





This creation is FAR from subtle.









Center of project:


Mark on the diagonal a 1" grid Choose a decorative stitch Stitch with a twin needle
















Creating the Piped Prairie Points




Blue is my "piping" edge





Stitch Using a 1/2" seam allowance.








Press the seam allowance towards the ''piping'' edge

Embellish "piping" edge with a decorative stitch







Fold and press excess "piping" fabric to the back


Press both long strips







Cut into 5" sections



Fold in from the outer edges to form the Prairie Point

Press






Cut the prairie points to 1.5" from top to bottom

Adding the Borders and Backing





Backing fabric fused with batting



Center your embroidered project on the batting side of the backing







Stitch two short borders on the top and bottom


Stitch two long borders on the right and left

Cut down to a 12" square















Right side of the binding to the right side of the back of the project (Single layer of binding)

Raw Edges Even
1/2" seam allowance









Miter Corners
Join the beginning and ending of the binding
Press Binding Up over the Seam Allowance
Then fold to front

Press

Pin in place






From the back stitch in the ditch




Trim away excess binding fabric from the front of your project





Cover the raw edge of the binding with a decorative stitch, matching needle and bobbin thread









Embroidery Decoupage/Free Standing Embroidery





This design has the organza showing when the design is finished so that is why I choose to stabilize in the way outlined below



Hoop a layer of polyester or nylon organza, a layer of polyester or nylon no show mesh stabilizer, and a layer of polyester or nylon organza in your hoop.

Thread with rayon embroidery thread in the bobbin and the needle and stitch out the design

Use a "heat tool" to melt away the excess organza and stabilizer, the rayon thread will not melt because it is a natural fiber.

Take the free standing design and stitch it to your project.

This method takes the "fear out of placement" since you are not embroidering directly on your project.



This technique can be used on most designs. In this design the stabilizer and organza will be completely covered with stitching so you could use 2 pieces of no show mesh and one piece of organza. You could also use water soluble stabilizer. If you don't wan to have to rinse your design after stitching do not use water soluble.







Once your embroidery is finished stitching and the excess stabilizer has been removed you can then place your designs where you want them and stitch them in place.













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
